## **CHECKLIST**

The opioid crisis is affecting a wide range of industries, including commercial real estate – especially the building owners and security teams responsible for those spaces.

Here's a list of steps you can take to adopt a more human-centred approach to meet these challenges.

	PARTNERSHIPS	
1	Identify and partner with local social services, addiction recovery programs and housing providers	
2	Arrange regular meetings between property management, social workers and law enforcement	
3	Participate in industry working groups or advocacy initiatives, such as BOMA's stakeholder group	
4	Build out mental health campaigns which include social media, posters, etc.	
	TECHNOLOGY	
5	Install tamper-proof alarms or sensors in vulnerable spaces, such as bathrooms and stairwells	
6	Provide safe lighting in underused areas to discourage unsafe behaviour	
7	Budget for technologies that offer both discretion and early detection of incidents	
	STAFF	
8	Provide de-escalation training tailored to addiction and mental health scenarios	
9	Train staff in compassionate engagement and non-discriminatory practices	
10	Stock naloxone kits on-site and ensure staff and security are trained to use them	
11	Offer competitive wages for security staff to reduce turnover	
12	Implement clear incident reporting protocols and staff debriefs	
13	Log each incident discreetly and professionally, maintaining confidentiality	
14	Provide janitorial staff with proper PPE, such as gloves, tongs and sharps disposal containers	
	AUDIT AND IMPROVE BUILDING ACCESS	
15	Add monitors to high-risk areas such as stairwells, parking garages and mechanical rooms	
16	Implement access restrictions where necessary	
17	Ensure emergency exits are clear, well-marked and adequately lit	
	TENANTS	
18	Encourage tenants to educate their own teams on compassionate response strategies	
19	Provide a kit for each tenant that includes a list of who to call in case of emergency, site maps and building policies
